Saginaw County Community Health Improvement Partners of Saginaw - Alignment Saginaw/Saginaw Community Foundation, Covenant HealthCare, Health Delivery, Inc., St. Mary's of Michigan, Saginaw County Community Mental Health Authority, Saginaw County Department of Public Health, Saginaw Department of Health and Human Services, and the Saginaw Intermediate School District.



STEERING COMMITTEE

- Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) published and presented to the public.
- Action Groups and Plans reestablished based on updated Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA).
- Saginaw County Health and Social Equity Advisory Group formed to advise the CHIP Steering Committee.

HEALTH AND SOCIAL EQUITY ADVISORY GROUP

- Established structure and developed goals and strategies for the group.
- Trained group members on racism, classism, and other types of oppression as root causes of health.
- Received \$1,000 donation and \$4,995 from the Ingham County Health Department.
- Identified transportation as a leading determinant of health inequities and planning a course of action to improve transportation using a Health in All Policies approach.



ACTION GROUP HIGHLIGHTS



Emerging Models of Health Services Delivery Health Action Group:

- Saginaw County Enrollment Advocacy Network (SCEAN) formed to collectively assist residents with health care enrollment
- 4,456 Saginaw County residents signed up for Affordable Care Act Marketplace coverage in 2014 (39% of estimated number of potential Market place enrollees) *source: Kaiser Family Foundation
- 10,196 Saginaw County residents are now enrolled in the Healthy Michigan Plan (Medicaid expansion), representing 90% of expected eligible.*source: MDCH February Enrollment Report
- Saginaw Community Care Hub officially launched –with common contact number for Pathways to Better Health and Home Visiting Hub - allowing county residents to be verified and referred for appropriate adult or child home visiting services
- 16 early child professionals cross trained as Pathways Community Health Workers
- Saginaw Pathways to Better Health Community Care HUB received national certification by the Rockville Institute and the Georgia Health Policy Center
- 1648 clients enrolled in Saginaw Pathways to Better Health, to date
- Home Visiting Hub database complete



Infant Mortality Action Group:

- Increase in the ability to do outreach through preventative home visiting
- Conducted Safe Sleep/Healthy Pregnancy survey throughout County
- Safe Sleep/Healthy Pregnancy survey results reviewed by the Pediatric and Family Health Subcommittee
- Working on goals, objectives and activities to address results of Safe Sleep/Healthy Pregnancy survey with emphasis on addressing health disparities



Chronic Diseases Action Group:

- Collaborated with SCCMHA for referrals to Friends for Recovery Center
- Promoted YMCA Health Challenge to the community, program began with 72 participants ending with 48
- Covenant started an amputation program with their Physical Therapy program
- Provided 200 Healthy Home Assessments, 300 Lead Risk Assessments, and 225 Lead Abatement Projects
- Educated Saginaw and Bay County WIC and HDI staff on the recognition and preventions of lead exposure of children in families enrolled in their clinic



Obesity (Step Up Saginaw) Action Group:

- Kids Run the Nation and Girls on the Run Expansion
- 30 Individual gardens created in the City of Saginaw
- Nutrition and Physical Activity permanent message boards posted in Saginaw County Rail Trails
- Investment in Food Access through Downtown Farmers Market
- Farm to Preschool Pilot
- Worksite Wellness initiatives offered
- Over 250 classrooms in County received nutrition education classes



Behavioral Health Action Group:

- 30 Trauma Informed Care-related events held to date
- 513 Saginaw youth and adults trained to-date In Mental Health First Aid
